REVOLUTIONISTS.

The Revolutionary War- Shots Heard Round the World by John Ferling.

This session looks at Ferling's book about the Revolutionary War as we come up to the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence for our nation. He especially points out the war and democracy at that time in history. We will look at the legacy and the promise. **Instructor: Ted Miller**

Waves and War: Commodore Oliver Perry and the Battle of Lake Erie

Lake Erie is the most pivotal sea battle of the War of 1812 when Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry bested British naval forces on September 10, 1813. The Battle of Lake Erie is commemorated by Perry's Victory Monument on Put-in-Bay, and many lake shore residents fly Perry's "DON'T GIVE UP THE SHIP!" flag from their stoops. Historian Kevin Moore, who recently published a historical short fiction set during the battle titled "Waves of War," will discuss an overview of the War of 1812, the leadup to the Battle of Lake Erie, the events of the day, some of the personalities involved, and Commodore Perry's significance in American history. Hidden in Plain Sight: The Secret Story of Freedom Quilts

This presentation explores the compelling legends and oral history of how enslaved people were secretly guided to navigate the Underground Railroad. How did the “monkey wrench” and “Flying geese” convey messages about escape routes, safe houses, and necessary provisions? This presentation examines the ingenuity and resilience of both those seeking freedom and those supporting freedom, who turned ordinary objects into tools of communication, in a world where literacy was forbidden. **Instructor: Kathy Dowd**

In 1917 Russia there were actually two revolutions, one which overthrew the Romanov Dynasty, and the subsequent one which brought Communists, including Lenin, to power. An accessible reference for this period is Robert Massie's *Nicholas and Alexander*, though reading the book before the class is not necessary.

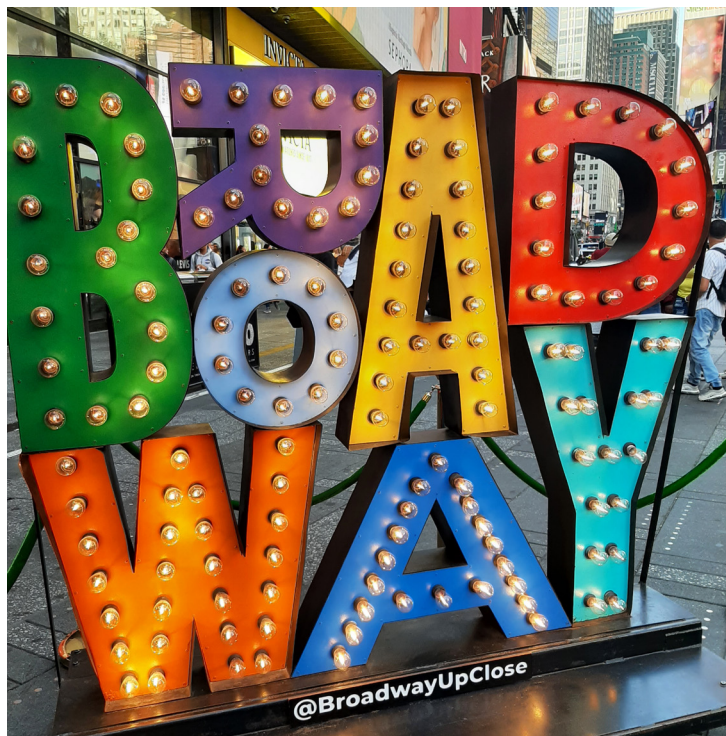

Introduction to “Cosmos Revisited”: Carl Sagan’s “Cosmos” series from October 1980 through December of that year, was the most-watched limited series in the history of American public television; a record since surpassed by Ken Burns’ “Civil War” series.

“Cosmos Revisited” programs will last 13 weeks, with a one-hour video per session, followed by discussion if wanted by class members. The series will take us through some 13 or so billion years of cosmic history and evolution that has transformed matter into this complex chemistry we call life. The series will also trace the history of the discoveries that scientists have made in order to understand what we know today. Join us on our journey and find out how we are “star stuff”!!

The Shores of the Cosmic Ocean

We explore the Cosmos, “which is all that is, or ever was, or ever will be.” In our spaceship of imagination, we will start at the outer limits of our known universe and travel to this little blue marble we call earth, stopping along the way to visit things we encounter in space. **Instructor: David Pasch**

Citizen Science & Stewardship at Earth Heart Farms

Earth Heart Farms is an 80-acre wildlife habitat that was transitioned over 30 years ago from family farmland. The private land is now home to flora and fauna native to NW Ohio wetland, grassland and riparian areas, and hosts a variety of activities related to monitoring and improving biodiversity and resource quality.

Session 1 explores the EHF restoration and stewardship initiative, and how to get involved through Citizen Science and STEAM Education. 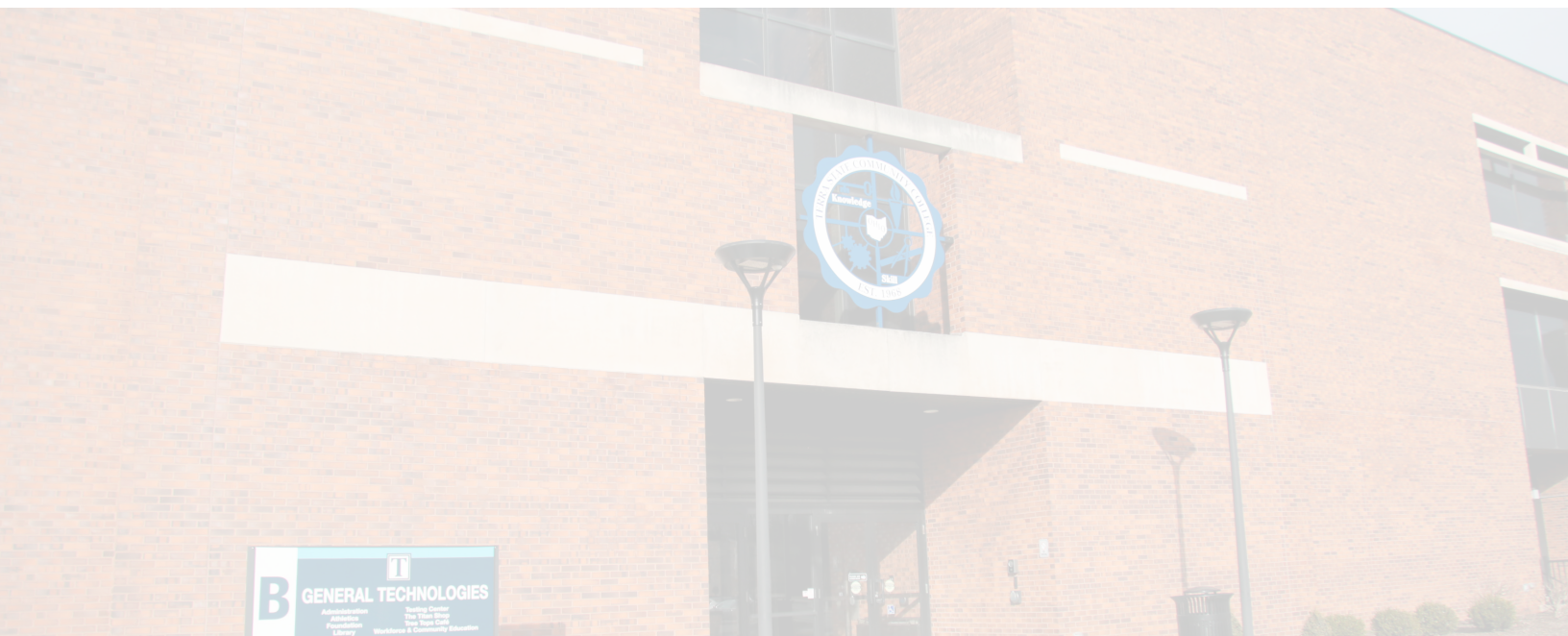
